Children's Corner

First Reading - Isaiah 53: 4-12

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all. He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Out of his anguish he shall see light; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge. The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out himself to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors. *Word of God, word of life.*

Second Reading – Hebrews 5:1-10

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honour, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, 'You are my Son, today I have begotten you'; as it is said also in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.


Gospel – Mark 10:35-45 The Gospel according to Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.' And he said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' And they said to him, 'Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.' But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?' They replied, 'We are able.' Then Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.' When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, 'You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

Sermon

Mark 10:35-45



Have you ever had one of those days when everything seems to happen at once, and you have to quickly figure out what to do first? The phone rings, the doorbell chimes, the kitchen timer beeps telling you supper needs to come out of the oven, and you need to go to the bathroom. Sheesh! Life can be complicated. That's what these days have been like. An atmospheric river again; global warming, trouble in Ukraine, in Gaza, in Lebanon; friends who are sick; family stress; politics; voting... and on

it goes.

Sometimes the world around us is demanding. What are we supposed to do?

You will drink...

The gospel story has been moving us toward Jerusalem... a place of trouble for Jesus. There have been encounters with women, men and children, seeking acceptance, forgiveness and grace. The disciples watched it all. Jesus spoke of his coming suffering, death and rising. Followers were fearful, some moved slowly, and then there were James and John.

In any group, a few have leadership skills, others pair up, and some work quietly in the background. James and John were called into situations probably to develop their leadership skills. I wonder if they frequently find themselves at the head of the line because others would give way. They were popular like the class clown or the one with painted face and drum cheering the football team.



Like in my story with the kids about my brother and I trying to sit closest to dad in the front seat, they sidle up near Jesus and seek a special privilege. He listened and responded. However, they got more information than they bargained for, and the answer was, "Sorry, can't do that." Our prayers can be like that too

They claimed to be ready to drink the cup of suffering, and be baptized or swamped with the trouble coming for Jesus. They were told: "You will get your share." Some years later, James was put to death by Herod Agrippa; and at the cross, Jesus assigned John the humble duty as caregiver for Mary for the rest of her life. Perks and the glory they wanted were outside Jesus' job description. We need to slow down and find God in the moment, even in pain, rather than look for a victory party. Soon enough in Jerusalem, all the disciples would leave Jesus hanging out with two thieves, one at his right hand and one at his left, on crosses. Sometimes the world is not a very nice place. What can you do?

Jesus called them... together

Troubles find us. Either we feel hurt and isolate ourselves, or find help and try to sort things out. Strength and support is in coming together. That is why we gather at anniversaries, birthdays, and the death of loved ones to give or receive support.

James and John were heard appealing for preferential treatment, and the others took offence. Did they think they were better or more deserving than the rest? Jesus wouldn't allow for that. Murmurings and hard feelings take a toll, so he called them... together.

I learned many important things from Indigenous friends over the years. That community at its best has much to offer like the power of the circle where everyone is on an equal footing. It has been called the geometry of communication. First Nations teach the deep regard for women and their life-giving role in community, the respect for the elderly, and the quiet listening to wisdom. Then there is also laughter; and the recognition of being a partners in creation rather than controllers of it. We can thrive when we model caring and put others first. That's where Jesus was going.

When we graciously accept support we can manage. When we demand for ourselves, others can be easily hurt and the world is again not a very nice place. "Be servants, create the world you want to live in, and be there for each other," Jesus tells his friends.

Tyrants?... Not so among you...

Privilege doesn't help much. The identity of God's people is found in being servants. The media shows us that we live in a world that always wants more and runs over the weak. Servants are rare lights in a dark places. They lift people from the trash heap. They raise the dead. They provide a freedom like being ransomed from fear. On the cross, Jesus served us with new hope. In our lives with others, we are the servants.

We will have cups of suffering and may be swamped with troubles in life. When the world is demanding and not a nice place, we are a caring community that works things out. We offer our gifts to each another. Some of us are loud, strong and big as life; some are quiet and notice the little things. We stand together against what defeats the weak. We celebrate moments. We mourn losses.

We are the people of God. We have each other. We follow Christ. Our theme is: *How may we serve you?* Our joy is: *We love because He loved us first.*

What are we supposed to do in this troubled world? May God give us hearts strong enough to greet each day and each person in it. We create the world we want to live in, one person at a time. Whether we are first or last, God has a place for each of us.

Sometimes the world is not a very nice place... but we can make a difference. **Amen.**
